String and Orchestra Workshop



Students who play instruments and have one to one peripatetic lessons had the opportunity to take part in workshops to learn the basic techniques to play effectively together as an orchestra. The students had played together in small groups during the year but had not experienced the effect of being part of an ensemble consisting of string and woodwind instruments.

Under the guidance of Ms Di Bartolo holding the conductor's baton they practised following a beat, and knowing when to join in the musical piece. The workshop focussed on 'Hymn for the Weekend' originally by Coldplay, music that most of the students were familiar with.

It was so good to see that many students are learning to play instruments, not just the guitar or drums but also the cello, violin, flute and saxophone.

A fun time was had by all as they went through sections of the routine until they could perform it all the way through.


After two hours the dancers quickly came to be a cohesive group of movers.

House Champions 2016


