Wizard of Oz

Both performances were a sell out and received with rapturous applause. The cast and crew are to be congratulated for such an ambitious production - one of the best ever. Audiences left with smiling faces, reminiscent of childhood memories of the magical journey along the yellow brick road.

Everyone knows the story behind the title made famous by the film of the same name starring the legendary Judy Garland.

The cast and musicians filled the auditorium with energy, sparkle and colour whilst the back stage, the crew enabled the scene settings to be swiftly changed and the sound and lighting effects were mastered with perfection. The incredible

roll of thunder to depict the tornado and the creaking of the tin man were amazingly thought out and executed.

As for the cast, there are just too many adjectives to describe their outstanding performances. With a rendition of 'Over the Rainbow' that could pass for professional and an uplifting chorus of 'Ding Dong the Witch is Dead' there was just nothing to fault in this captivating performance. Add in the 9-piece orchestra led by Miss di Bartolo and you could be watching a professional theatre production.

Ally Stuart was the perfect choice to play Dorothy - we know she can sing, we know she can act, but to do both together was an incredible achievement. Her portrayal of Dorothy was delightful and her sense of innocence just right. Sam Phillips as the Scarecrow proved a favourite of the audience and added just enough comedy to bring his role alive. Sam Jennah as Tin Man was equally well received with his stiff and creaky movements - his make up and costume was also incredible which gave his character more credence. Boris Mijalcev as the Cowardly Lion stole the audience hearts with his endearing and infectious personality.

Special mention must also go to Lois Levi as the Wicked Witch of the West and Josie Yahia as the Good Witch. Lois and Josie complemented each other perfectly in their ongoing 'good versus evil' conflict, with Lois oozing dark, malevolent cackling in contrast with Josie wonderful vocals and stage presence. Marta Carli as Gloria was as always a fine example of the talent at Ashcroft. Her singing is joyous and she oozes the cute factor.

Other principal characters deserve equal praise - Shay O'Donnell as the Munchkin Mayor, Louis Hill as the Munchkin Farmer, Nii Allotey as Uncle Henry, Naia Okeke as Aunt Em and Konrad Crous as Lord Growli - all brought the production alive accompanied by an able group of chorus members.

Youssef Abou Shady as The Wizard was a delight. His booming and frightening voice echoed the auditorium with the audience believing he would appear as a big bad character. Out popped Youssef who everyone knows as a guiet and studious student yet he loves drama who brought a compelling philosophy to end the show ensuring everyone got their wish - Dorothy to go home, Scarecrow to realise he already had a brain, Tin Man to find he had a big heart and Cowardly Lion to believe in himself.

ATA Medical Society hosted a Work Experience and Reflection workshop during lunchtime on Tuesday this week, delivered by David Harrison from St. George's Hospital Medical School. It was attended by twenty five Year 12 students who are considering pursuing a career in healthcare.

The workshop focussed on advising students to reflect upon experiences in order to be able to demonstrate at interview how these have led to personal development. It was expressed that all experiences could be relevant, including all types of experience of working (paid and unpaid) and volunteering as long as they could be used to show development.

Changes that have taken place to the format of medical school interviewing were also helpfully communicated. The detail of the new process will need to be explained in more depth and this will be the focus of an upcoming workshop.


Also this week, the STEAMies switched rotations and there was plenty of STEAM enrichment enjoyed!

Club, the Year 8 STEAMies formally began their Rocket Car challenge and learned about super speed cars, their amazing design features and their capabilities.


STEAM Language



National Storytelling Week Competition


As part of the National Storytelling Week, LRC ran a 'Draw your favourite character from a story'. The winners received house points and a prize for their efforts. the winners were:


