Student from Years 7, 8 and 9 stepped into the spotlight and performed a mixture of their favourite work by published poets and their selfpenned poems in front of an audience of parents and teachers. Such was the verve for writing their own poetry we simply had to introduce a separate category for poems written by the students themselves, offering up even more house points!

The winner of the 'published' poem category was Lois Levi for her captivating and incredibly well-rehearsed rendition of 'Pretty' by Katie Makkai, closely followed by Marguerite Venning's brilliant reading of William Wordsworth's 'Daffodils'. In the 'self-written' category, Medhane Robel claimed the 100 house point winner's prize for his touching poem, 'How I See the World'. In second place was Anastasia Champagne for her poem 'The Doctor', an excellent example of sustained, sophisticated rhyme.

Ife Grillo, who spoke to the students about how his experiences growing up had inspired his poetry. All participants deserve heaps of praise for their fantastic performances; they all worked incredibly hard on their chosen and self-written poems. Last Friday The Carnegie group (we are an avid band of readers from Year 8, 9 and 10) cast our votes for what we felt was the best book from the Carnegie shortlist. We would be told the outcome when we met in LRC the following Monday to find out the most popular book amongst the group. On Monday, Miss Shaw revealed first who we had most voted for and our winner was 'Salt to the Sea' by Ruta Sepetys. The tension grew as we waited for the next announcement of who the esteemed Carnegie judges had chosen, would they have chosen the book we had thought was best? Miss Shaw then said, after what seemed an age of silence that the Winner of the Carnegie award 2017 was ... Salt to the Sea by Ruta Sepetys". Our excitement then grew as we realised that this was the author that we were due to see on Wednesday at the annual Wandsworth Carnegie event , this year held at Bolingbrook Academy.

On Wednesday we travelled to Bolingbrook Academy with Miss Shaw and Mr Patterson. The whole experience was amazing and Ruta Sepetys first talked about different jobs she had before becoming an author, including working in the music industry for 20 years helping bands to convey story through song. She had also written story lines for computer games. To our amazement we discovered that she had worked on Halo and also on Rachet and Clank. Ruta Sepetys then went on to

speak about 'Salt to the Sea', and what made her decide to write this story. 'Salt to the Sea' is set in the Second World War and follows the journey of four individuals who are trying to get to the coast to be evacuated by ship to escape the advancing Russian army. Ruta Sepetys talked about the rarely known maritime disaster of the Wilhelm Gustloff, a ship that was sunk in the



Baltic sea by a Russian submarine in 1945, The story had mainly remained a secret from the rest of the world for 70 years. The Wilhelm Gustloff was built to carry 1,463 people. On the day it was sunk, it was carrying 10,574. It is estimated that 9,400 people died.

We were delighted when we were given the chance to ask questions as Holly and Sam both had interesting questions to put to her. Ruta Sepetys announced that the movie rights to 'Salt to the Sea' has just been bought and will now be made into a film. We wish her luck on the creation of the film.
