## IB Results

This week the International Baccalaureate results were published. Students received an outstanding set of results which included a record number of students achieving 40 points or more.

Emma Burley, who achieved 41 points in her Diploma, will be reading History at Cambridge University from October. Kimberley Carstens was another student receiving exceptional results, achieving a new school record of 44 points including five grade 7s. Students' progress was also positive, with the overall results exceeding ALIS predictions.

These superb results allowed our students to secure places at top universities such as Durham and University College London. In the wake of the results the Academy received some very positive comments from students and parents with one parent emailing to say how pleased she was that her daughter (who achieved 42 points) had chosen to study at Ashcroft rather than her alternative choice, Wellington College.

We are still awaiting the final results but the provisional average point score per student of 36 points is likely to put our students in the top 21% of candidates worldwide.

## Who wants to be an entrepreneur?

Mr McGuinness arranged a visit from an entrepreneur to speak to business students from Years 10 and 12 last Monday.

Henri Cammiade, a 28 year old entrepreneur, who has created, managed and sold three businesses and is currently running and developing his 4th business, 'Keeome', a beauty therapy face mask business. Henri explained how he started his first business, having just completed his A levels at school and gone on holiday to Barcelona. Whilst in Barcelona he spotted a business opportunity and his two week holiday turned into a six month stay, where he generated a turnover of £250,000 and a net profit of £50,000. Not a bad start for an 18 year old on holiday.

Henri gave an inspiring talk to our Year 10 and 12 business students who were visibly buzzing by the end of his talk. He showed how students could take an idea and turn it into a business in a relatively short space of time.



## Spotlight on Achievement

Well done to Ana-Eva Tudor who had a wonderful experience at the Courtauld Institute of Art last week. Ana-Eva was awarded a place on the four day course, following a competitive application process.

She spent four days working with the gallery's conservation and curating team and attended a special programme of lectures with the institute's professors. Ana-Eva put together a proposal for her own exhibition and presented it at the end of the week at the Courtauld lecture theatre.

## London Zoo trip

Last Monday and Wednesday Year 12 Biology students visited London Zoo. In the morning they attended an educational talk on Zoo genetics and breeding, which is directly linked to their A level specification and they spent the remainder of the day researching an endangered species for their project. The Zoo demonstrated how genetic variation can be lost drastically in a single species from one traumatic event such as a tornado. The student also played Tiger Blind Date where they had to find the most suitable male tiger across the world to mate with the female tiger at London Zoo by looking at how closely related they might be and any infertility problems.

There was also time to enjoy the attractions that the Zoo has to offer!


Both days were thoroughly enjoyed by all students.

## Arts Week



There is something for everyone to enjoy.




